ImaginAction District Conference 2023 registration is now open. Join us May 11-14<sup>th</sup> 2023 in Saskatoon at the Travelodge for the District's most unique conference *EVER!* REGISTER HERE

One of the highlights of being in person at the ImaginAction District Conference 2023 will be a visit to Wanuskewin Heritage Park on Friday May 12<sup>th</sup>. During your visit to this National Historic Site, you have a couple of hours to enjoy a hike through the plains where Indigenous peoples lived for thousands of years, tour the galleries or visit the gift shop. A wonderful supper inspired by the land and which includes locally sourced products and ingredients will follow. Rhett Sangster, Director, Office of the Treaty Commissioner of Saskatchewan will be our keynote speaker for the evening.



There is only room for 150 guests for this supper, so register early.

When registering, enter guest or spouse information only if purchasing full registrations. You can purchase extra meal tickets for both the Wanuskewin evening (quantities limited) and for the supper and dance on Saturday night at the Travel Lodge.

We have 30 rooms reserved at the Travelodge (15 business King and 15 standard Queen) at a discounted rate of \$129 plus taxes per night. These rooms will be held until April 10<sup>th</sup>, so book early to avoid disappointment. Call the Travelodge at 306-242-8881 and quote block code 0511LBROT for the discounted rate.

Early Bird registration pricing for the conference is \$275.00 until March 31<sup>st</sup>. On April 1<sup>st</sup>, the registration amount goes to \$325 so save by registering now. Spousal fee is the same price due to the amazing meals they will have the opportunity to enjoy with you. Virtual registration cost is \$75.00.

At a recent President's meeting, participants had a chance to share how they are trying to keep their members engaged. Here are some of their responses.

- 1. Asking our members to find speakers for a month, each month, 2 members are assigned together to arrange speakers. We are trying to put together new members with older members to work together.
- 2. Asking our members to Participate in city wide fun events
- 3. 2 times a month volunteer sign up at Friendship Inn, Food Bank, etc for 2-hour shifts

- 5. Each month, we have been having one meeting outside of our regular meeting place, either at an interesting location or at least one hands on activity in the community. - 9. Lead by example in doing the tasks that are required for the programs and encouraging/ supporting other members to take action on the programs and ideas they have that they are passionate about.
